PUBLIC HEARINGS

Ordinance No. 19-01, An Ordinance To Provide For Installment Payments Of Taxable Real Property Within Darlington County Pursuant To Title 12, Chapter 45, Section 12-45-75 Of South Carolina Code Of Laws, As Amended

Chairman Hudson declared the public hearing open at 6:03 p.m. to receive comments on Ordinance No. 19-01. There being no comments, the public hearing was closed.

Ordinance No. 19-02, An Ordinance To Indefinitely Suspend Sunday Work Prohibitions, Commonly Referred To As Blue Laws, Pursuant To Title 53, Chapter 1, Section 53-1-160 Of South Carolina Code Of Laws, As Amended

Chairman Hudson declared the public hearing open to receive comments on Ordinance No. 19-02. There being no comments, the public hearing was closed.

Ordinance No. 19-03, An Ordinance To Amend Ordinance No. 18-04 (Darlington County FY18/19 Budget Ordinance) For A Supplemental Appropriation To The Library Fund To Receive And Expend Additional Lottery Funds And Establish The Effective Date Of This Ordinance

Chairman Hudson declared the public hearing open to receive comments on Ordinance No. 19-03. There being no comments, the public hearing was closed.

REGULAR MEETING

Call to Order / Invocation / Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Hudson called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m. Mr. Douglas presented the invocation and Mr. Flowers led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Citizens' Comments

Mr. John Smithey, of 1609 Society Hill Road, appeared to appeal the Planning Commission's decision made on April 15, 2019, approving the permit for a cell tower to be built on the Benton Farm about 450 feet from his home. Although he did not want to discuss the pros and cons regarding cell towers, he talked about the negative perception of towers giving off radiation, which could possibly decrease the value of his property. Mr. Smithey asked that if the tower goes up, could it be moved to another location on the Benton Farm where it would be out of sight. He also mentioned that another farmer was interested in having the tower built at/near the location of the former Round O School.

Mr. George Cannon reported that someone spoke to him on yesterday about a drainage problem where the person was building a house. The water was about a foot from the foundation on both sides of the house. Mr. Cannon questioned how the owners were able to obtain a permit to build a house at this location where it was flooding. He stated that he will continue to address County Council about the drainage problem in his neighborhood, although he has not received any answers in many years; not even when he was terminated from the rescue squad and the fire department. Mr. Cannon noted that the drainage problem has existed since 1965.

Ms. Diane Smith, of 613 Flicker Lane (South Park Subdivision off Highway 151 in Hartsville), reported that her area had never flood until the 100-year rain in 2016. Now the area floods after a 15-minute rain. The water covers the area and the road, which was destroying her property, driveway, etc. She has complained to the South Carolina

Department Of Transportation (SCDOT) and they placed a sign indicating water on the road. Later they stated that there may be a problem in the woods where the water supposed to drain into some type of culvert. However, the property owner must give SCDOT permission to go onto the property to do any work.

Ms. Mary Washington, of 606 Flicker Lane (South Park Subdivision), also talked about how the area floods when it rain. SCDOT told her the flooding was coming from a ditch near the back of her property.

Mr. Flowers asked whether County Council could send a letter to SCDOT.

Mr. Stewart responded that Flicker Lane was discussed at a recent CTC (County Transportation Committee) meeting and SCDOT was aware of the problem. Since this was a state road, there was nothing that the county could step in to do.

It was Roads and Bridges Director Bobby Richardson's understanding that SCDOT was trying to get the signatures of the property owners.

Ms. Louaine Thomas, of 2634 N. Governor Williams Highway, talked about how the trucks leaving Darlington Shredding Company at Nucor were littering the highway (Highway 52). She reported that when the trucks dump at Darlington Shredding Company, styrofoam type material remains in the back of the trucks and blows out as the trucks leave the facility and travel along Highway 52. She requested that something be done about this.

Mr. Douglas confirmed that the truckers were not cleaning out the back of their trucks before leaving Darlington Shredding, although there is a place for them to do so.

Mr. Flowers also talked about how the trash blows from the back of the trucks once they leave Darlington Shredding Company.

Mr. Stewart explained that the County Codes Enforcement Officers do not have blue lights and could not pull over the truckers.

Codes Enforcement Director Terri Cribb stated that the Sheriff has contacted state-level personnel regarding this matter, and someone was working in the area.

Personal Appearances - Ms. Pamela Prince, Darlington County Coordinator/Advocate, Pee Dee Coalition Against Domestic And Sexual Assault - Services, The Durant Children's Center, & Proclamation (Resolution No. 698 Proclaiming April As Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Ms. Pamela Prince was not present at the meeting.

Ms. Delores Bess, Counselor Advocate for Darlington County, announced that April is Sexual Assault and Child Abuse Awareness Month. She wants everyone to know about the free services provided through Pee Dee Coalition.

Ms. Alesha Rush, Family Advocate for the Durant Children's Center, reported that the Durant Children's Center serves children who have been abused, neglected, and/or have witnessed crimes. During last year, 646 children received service from this Center.

Mr. Kilgo pointed out that later during the meeting, he would offer an amendment to the proposed Resolution (Resolution No. 698) proclaiming April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month. He will move to replace "Pee Dee Region" with "Darlington County" since

Darlington County Council has no authority over the Pee Dee Region. The resolution will be revised to limit it to Darlington County.

Ms. Kioca Reed, Pee Dee Coalition's Rape Prevention Coordinator, thanked Council for its support which helped them service 59 special assault victims and over 600 child abuse victims.

Personal Appearances - Mrs. Tonya D. Flowers, Proposed Cell Phone Tower

Ms. Flowers reported that some of the residents of Mont Clare Community received a letter about a tower being placed within 1,500 feet of their home, and if they had any concerns, they needed to appear at the recent Planning Commission Meeting. The residents attended the meeting thinking that they would be heard. However, the Planning Commission approved the tower being placed at the proposed site because the tower representative had met all the regulations. During the meeting, the residents were instructed to talk with County Council and the FCC. Therefore, she filed a complaint with the FCC and was appearing before Council. Ms. Flowers provided Council with a copy of what was forwarded to her from the FCC. She said the FCC told her that the person installing the tower has 30 days to answer to them and to her.

Ms. Flowers' complaint was that the tower would be 500 feet from the home and she has no evidence as to how the tower being so close to her home would affect her husband who has several bullets lodged in his body, or how it would affect the health of the other residents (children, the elderly, etc.). Ms. Flowers also talked with the tower representative who could only give her scientific evidence regarding the tower and instructed her to talk with her husband's doctor for more information. On April 17th, her husband will see a doctor and get something in writing as to whether the proposed tower will affect him in any way. Ms. Flowers emphasized that she was not opposed to the tower, she just wants it placed further away from her home on the 160-acre parcel.

Ms. Dorothy McDonald also stated that husband was sick and uses a defibrillator. She asked that the tower be placed further away from their homes.

Amendment To The Agenda To Bring Forth Executive Session

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Douglas to amend the agenda to bring forth both executive sessions (for discussion of negotiations incident to proposed intergovernmental contractual arrangement with the Town of Society Hill for certain services, and receipt of legal advice where the legal advice relates to a pending, threatened, or potential claim regarding permit for communication towers).

The motion carried unanimously.

Amendment To The Agenda For Appointment To The Historical Commission

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to amend the agenda, Section 11.A., to add an appointment by Mr. Kilgo to the Historical Commission since there had been a resignation.

The motion carried unanimously.

Executive Session – (1) Discussion Of Negotiations Incident To Proposed Intergovernmental Contractual Arrangement With The Town of Society Hill For Certain Services (2) Receipt Of Legal Advice Where The Legal Advice Relates To A Pending, Threatened, Or Potential Claim Regarding Permit For Communication Towers

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Brown for Council to go into executive session with the County Attorney and County Administrator.

The motion carried unanimously.

Council, the County Attorney, and the County Administrator went into executive session at 6:33 p.m. and reconvened at 6:50 p.m. Upon reconvening, Chairman Hudson announced that no action was taken in Executive Session.

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to approve the receipt of the Consent Agenda items as information.

The motion carried unanimously.

Approval Of Minutes – Minutes Of Regular Meeting, March 4, 2019

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Davis to approve the minutes of March 4, 2019.

The motion carried unanimously.

Ordinances

Ordinance No. 19-01. An Ordinance To Provide For Installment Payments Of Taxable Real Property Within Darlington County Pursuant To Title 12, Chapter 45, Section 12-45-75 Of South Carolina Code Of Laws, As Amended. SECOND READING

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Davis to approve second reading of Ordinance No. 19-01.

Mr. Flowers asked whether the staff had a cost impact statement for implementing such a plan and whether the county has the necessary infrastructure to make this program cost feasible.

Mr. Stewart reported that it would take about \$8,700 to add the software to the Treasurer's side of the software package and about \$1,200 per year for maintenance of the

software package for the required printing of the coupons, mailings, etc. The staff time would be absorbed in their current time.

Mr. Stewart pointed out that, if approved, individuals will be prepaying their taxes prior to the taxes being levied; individuals wanting to make installment payments will have to notify the Treasurer between December 2019 and January 15, 2020, for their Fall bill that they will receive in October 2020; payments will begin in February and continue every other month as stipulated in the law; and there is no process in state law for installment payments after the tax bills go out. He emphasized that this plan would be prepayment of taxes.

It was Mr. Flowers' opinion that this would be an expensive operation for the number of residents who will take advantage of it.

Mr. Stewart stated that he would not know what type of participation there would be. However, some people may not want to pay taxes in advance.

Mr. Brown reported that businesses have called him to express an interest in this program.

Ms. Thomas wanted to know how people would be informed about installment payments for taxes.

Mr. Stewart explained that the law was clear that people wanting to be on the installment payment plan would have to notify the Treasurer, in writing, between December 1st and January 15th of the preceding tax year. Then the Treasurer will notify the Auditor and the Assessor. The Treasurer will print and mail the coupons and envelopes to the people who have signed up. Then the person is responsible for making his/her payments on time without any additional reminders. If someone fails to make any of the payments on time, the Treasurer will remove him/her from the program and the remaining taxes will become due when the bill is posted in the Fall and by January of the following year. Individuals wishing to be removed from the program must also contact the Treasurer between December 1st and January 15th of the following year. It will be the taxpayers' responsibility to notify the Treasurer.

Mr. Douglas questioned whether this will require additional staff in the Treasurer's Office.

Mr. Stewart stated that if there is a lot of participation, there will be more work to be done in the Treasurer's Office. Without an extremely high rate of participation, there should be a nominal amount of work that could be absorbed into the current workforce. Adding a base position would add about \$40,000.

Mr. Flowers said he would vote against this for second reading. However, if it passes second reading, he would vote for third reading if someone could show him that it would be fiscally responsible to do.

The motion carried with Mr. Douglas and Mr. Flowers opposing.

Ordinance No. 19-02. An Ordinance To Indefinitely Suspend Sunday Work Prohibitions, Commonly Referred To As Blue Laws, Pursuant To Title 53, Chapter 1, Section 53-1-160 Of South Carolina Code Of Laws, As Amended. SECOND READING

MOTION was made by Ms. Thomas and seconded by Mr. Kilgo to approve second reading of Ordinance No. 19-02.

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to amend Section 2.b. of the Ordinance to delete the word “church” and replace it with “worship” to read as follows:

- b) solely during the ~~church~~ **regular worship** service hours of the ~~church~~ **worship center** of his or her choice. Any employer who dismisses, demotes, discriminates or otherwise penalizes an employee because he or she is a conscientious objector to Sunday work or because he or she chooses not to work during specific ~~church~~ **worship** service hours is subject to a civil penalty of triple the damages found by the court or the jury, plus court costs and the employee's attorney's fees. The court may order the employer to rehire or reinstate the employee in the same position he/she was in prior to the dismissal or demotion without forfeiture of compensation, rank, or grade.

Mr. Kilgo explained that this would allow the ordinance to cover synagogues and other worship centers and not just Christians.

The motion carried unanimously to approve the amendment.

Chairman Hudson called for the vote, as amended.

Mr. Coker asked whether this was in line with what the municipalities were already doing. He also wanted confirmation that, currently, businesses outside the city limits could not open until a certain time and those inside the city limits could.

Mr. Stewart stated that this was his understanding. The ordinance would allow what happens within the municipalities to happen in the county.

Chairman Hudson called for the vote to approve second reading of Ordinance No. 19-02, as amended.

The motion carried unanimously.

Ordinance No. 19-03. An Ordinance To Amend Ordinance No. 18-04 (Darlington County FY18/19 Budget Ordinance) For A Supplemental Appropriation To The Library Fund To Receive And Expend Additional Lottery Funds And Establish The Effective Date Of This Ordinance. SECOND READING

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Brown to approve second reading of Ordinance No. 19-03.

The motion carried unanimously.

Ordinance No. 19-04. An Ordinance To Amend Darlington County Code Of Ordinances. Appendix A (Development Standards Ordinance). Article 13 (Requirements For Mobile And Manufactured Homes). Resolution No. 698. Proclamation For Sexual Awareness Month, April 2019

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to approve Resolution No. 698.

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to amend Resolution No. 698 to strike "*Pee Dee Region*" in the first sentence and next to the last sentence and replace with "*Darlington County.*"

The motion carried unanimously.

Chairman Hudson called for the vote to approve Resolution No. 698, as amended.
The motion carried unanimously.

Committee Reports

There were no committee reports.

Other Items

Appointments To Boards & Commissions To Fill Vacancies. Expired Terms. Terms Expiring 6/30/19. & Attendance

Mr. Kilgo announced that Rev. Hunter Jordan had moved and resigned from the Historical Commission. Therefore, he nominated Mr. Bryan Hobbs for appointment to the Historical Commission. Mr. Flowers seconded by nominations. The vote was unanimous. Mr. Hobbs will fill the unexpired term through June 30, 2020.

Mr. Kilgo carried over his appointment to the Airport Commission, Alcohols and Drug Citizen Advisory Committee, Ambulance Commission, Board of Assessment Appeals, Parks & Recreation Commission, and Planning Commission.

Ms. Thomas nominated Ms. Vernessia Patterson for reappointment to the Library Board. The vote was unanimous. Ms. Patterson will serve a full-term commencing July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2023.

Ms. Thomas carried over her appointment to the Alcohols and Drug Citizen Advisory Committee and Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals.

Mr. Hudson nominated Ms. Ann Weaver for reappointment to the Ambulance Commission. **MOTION** was made by Mr. Brown and seconded by Mr. Flowers to reappoint Ms. Anne Weaver to the Ambulance Commission. The vote was unanimous. Ms. Weaver will serve a second term commencing July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2023.

Mr. Hudson carried over his appointment to the Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals, Library Board, and Parks & Recreation Commission.

Mr. Flowers carried over his appointment to Airport Commission, Alcohols and Drug Citizen Advisory Committee, Ambulance Commission, Board of Assessment Appeals, Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals, Historical Commission, and Planning Commission.

Mr. Davis carried over his appointment to the Board of Assessment Appeals, Library Board, Parks & Recreation Commission, and Planning Commission.

Mr. Brown nominated Mr. Richard Atkinson for reappointment to the Airport Commission. **MOTION** was made by Mr. Brown and seconded by Mr. Kilgo to reappoint Mr. Richard Atkinson to the Airport Commission. The motion carried unanimously. Mr. Atkinson will serve a third term commencing July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2023.

Mr. Brown carried over his appointment to the Alcohols and Drug Citizen Advisory Committee.

Mr. Coker carried over his appointment to the Alcohols and Drug Citizen Advisory Committee, Board of Assessment Appeals, and Parks & Recreation Commission.

Uphold Or Rescind American Tower (Benton Brothers) Permit To Erect A Tower At 1631 Society Hill Road In Darlington. As Approved By Darlington County Planning Commission On March 19, 2019 (Tax Map # 180-00-01-008.T)

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Kilgo to carry over the American Tower permit.

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Kilgo to amend the motion, per the ordinance, that should there be an appeal, Council will appoint a referee for a decision.

Attorney Cox confirmed that there is an appeal. Therefore, Council could go ahead and appoint a referee, if inclined to do so.

Mr. Flowers stated that by doing this, Council will have created a position of a special referee for a decision as Council carries over this matter. Therefore, in the next 30 days, Council will vote on this and appoint the referee.

Attorney Cox clarified that Council could consider giving the County Administrator the authority to appoint the referee.

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Flowers to amend the motion to give the County Administrator the authority to appoint a special referee.

The motion carried unanimously.

Mrs. Thomas asked whether this will appear within the next 30 days.

Attorney Cox explained that the Council was giving the County Administrator the authority to appoint a referee which will allow him to set a date and possibly come back with a recommendation at Council's next meeting.

In response to Mr. Douglas' request for clarification, Attorney Cox explained that the referee selected by the County Administrator will set a hearing time for everyone to come in and argue their case. The referee's recommendation will come back to Council to be voted on. Both sides will be present. Because the citizens have filed an appeal, the tower company will come to respond to the appeal. Then the hearing officer will come back to County Council with his findings and the reason(s) for his findings for Council to approve or disapprove.

Chairman Hudson called for the vote to carry over the permit.

The motion carried unanimously.

Cooperative Service Agreement Between Darlington County And US Department Of Agriculture. Animal And Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS)/Wildlife Services (WS). (Beaver Program) \$35,000

MOTION was made by Mr. Flowers and seconded by Mr. Douglas to approve the Cooperative Service Agreement between Darlington County and USDA, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service/Wildlife Services for Beaver Program, \$35,000.

In response to Ms. Thomas' question regarding the success of this program, it was noted that Council receives a monthly Beaver report in Council's agenda package.

The motion carried unanimously.

Request For Approval Of The Historical Commission & Museum Official Logo

MOTION was made by Mr. Kilgo and seconded by Mr. Douglas to approve the Historical Commission and Museum's official logo as presented.

The motion carried unanimously.

Administrative Update – Mr. Charles Stewart, County Administrator

Mr. Stewart reminded Council members of Council's Budget Worksession scheduled for Wednesday, April 3, 2019, at 9 a.m. to review the FY19/20 proposed budget.

Requests / Comments - Members Of Council

Mr. Davis informed the citizens that the flooding problem in the Flicker Lane area will be addressed by South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT). County Council could not do anything about the problem. He also mentioned that sometimes individuals will not provide the necessary rights-of-way for the state (SCDOT) to go onto their private property.

Mr. Douglas stated that he did not know anything about the proposed tower until two weeks ago. He felt that it was fair enough to have a hearing to request that the tower be relocated further back on the parcel.

Mr. Brown pointed out and talked about the number of animals received at the Darlington County Animal Shelter. He stated that this was a "black eye" for the county. Mr. Brown commended the work of the Humane Society.

Mr. Flowers mentioned the rules about speaking from the audience and asked those present to provide their contact information to the Clerk to Council in order to be contacted about the tower hearing.

Ms. Thomas also mentioned that Council members did not know about the tower. She briefly talked about the need to communicate with the public. Ms. Thomas asked whether the staff had any information regarding a road being paved that was located somewhere off Rogers Road. Roads and Bridges Director Bobby Richardson was not aware of this.


